






Aberlour 150th Anniversary Creative Communities

In March 2025, in the Aberlour Debt Conference, we hosted a workshop focused on the systems change work we are driving with the council and our lived experience partners. Additionally, we are beginning a collaborative project across Tayside, working with local councils and third-sector partners to develop and implement training for frontline staff. This training aims to allow frontline staff to engage with individuals experiencing financial hardship.

A new 12-month Scottish Government funded service will be coming to Tayside in the next couple of weeks.

The Tayside Intensive Perinatal service will provide support to new and expectant parents impacted by substance use. We will offer emotional and practical support to help families grow strong together.

Shelley Brown will be the service manager leading on this work, and we are in the process of recruiting 6 IP project workers, 2 for each local authority. Katie Mew will be one of the IP support workers for Dundee and Susan Donoghue will be a support worker for Angus. Shumaila Hammad will also transfer over as the admin support for the new service. Congratulations to them all on their new appointments.

This is a national programme that will also see IP services developed in Tayside, Glasgow and Falkirk and Aberlour are delighted to have been chosen to lead on this work to improve outcomes for women and babies across Scotland.
